Long Range: There is a broad ridge across North America with a trough in the Four Corners. The trough will continue to slowly move eastward through the week. The ridge will buckle late in the week as a trough moves down into Canada through the coming weekend. This will create more zonal flow from west to east as troughs and ridges pass through going into April. The U.S. and European models are fairly similar through the period, but develop the disturbances a bit differently as they pass through. I will use a blend, but favor the European. For the outlook period, temperatures on Saturday will be above normal in the West and below normal in the East. Temperatures will rise and fall as systems pass through the country going into April. A system will move into the West this weekend, then through the country next week. Scattered showers followed by seasonally cooler air is expected. -DTN

NORTHERN PLAINS (WHEAT/LIVESTOCK): Warm and dry conditions were noted over the weekend. A system in the West will bring some showers through the region into Monday but will be light. Another system moving through later in the week will bring temperatures down for eastern areas going through the weekend. But drought continues to be a concern before planting starts up. -DTN

CENTRAL/SOUTHERN PLAINS (LIVESTOCK/WINTER WHEAT): Warm and dry conditions were noted over the weekend. A system in the West will move through on Monday and Tuesday with widespread showers, including some snow from the Texas Panhandle into eastern Nebraska Monday night into Tuesday. This is the best chance for precipitation in western drought areas, but there may not be many chances moving forward. Drought will continue to be a negative force in the region, especially as wheat continues to grow out of dormancy. -DTN

MIDWEST (CORN/SOYBEANS/WINTER WHEAT): A system moved through on Friday and Saturday, bringing widespread light to moderate showers through most of the region, including in drought areas in eastern lowa, southern Wisconsin, and northern Illinois. A system moving through late Monday through Wednesday will bring





even more widespread showers through the region, keeping soils wetter in eastern areas, but improving drought in the northwest. Above normal temperatures will fall below normal behind the system and continue through the coming weekend. -DTN

PACIFIC NORTHWEST (WINTER WHEAT): Scattered showers moved through over the weekend, helping to build some snowpack and improve soil moisture prior to spring planting. Shower chances will become less frequent but appear to be adequate to finish out the month. -DTN

BRAZIL (CORN/SOYBEANS): Scattered showers moved through over the weekend but are becoming isolated in central and northern areas. A front will allow for some scattered showers in southern areas Wednesday through Friday before becoming drier again going into next week. Drought areas in the south need more rain and central areas will start to see moisture declining well before the dry season starts, which is unfavorable for developing safrinha corn. -DTN

ARGENTINA (CORN/SOYBEANS): Isolated showers moved through on Friday, but most areas were dry over the weekend. Isolated showers pop up on Monday, but a front clears out the region on Wednesday. Northern areas will see better showers than the central or south, which is overall inadequate for late-planted corn and soybeans.

CANADIAN PRAIRIES (LIVESTOCK): A few showers moved through on Sunday, but most areas were warm and dry this weekend. A front will move through late this week and while it will be mostly dry, will bring in some colder temperatures, though only briefly. Snow will continue to melt, though it may be slow, and additional precipitation will not be very heavy for at least the next week. Drought has improved in many areas over the winter, but it is still fairly widespread across the region. -DTN

EUROPE (WINTER WHEAT): Scattered showers fell across Spain and southern France, but it was mostly dry elsewhere this weekend. The showers improved soil moisture for winter wheat in Spain, but more is needed. Outside of Spain, most of the continent will be dry this week as temperatures slowly rise and more of the winter wheat crop awakens out of dormancy. Outside of some dryness that still remains in the west, conditions are fairly good for wheat. -DTN

BLACK SEA (WINTER WHEAT): Conditions for the wheat going into the winter were mixed and there are large concerns about production due to the war. Precipitation over the winter has been above normal and should set up plants in favorable shape for development as more of the crop slowly awakens from dormancy as temperatures rise above normal this week. Some slight chances for light showers exist, but most areas will remain dry this week. -DTN

NORTH AFRICA (WINTER WHEAT): Scattered showers fell across the region this weekend, improving soil moisture but it may be too late for most of the crop. Showers will continue to be in the area throughout the week. -DTN


